

We are direct and decisive. We are risk takers and problem solvers. We are more concerned with completing tasks and winning than we are with gaining approval from people. Daniel (Daniel 1-6), Job (Job 1:5, James 5:11), Martha (Luke 10:38-42)

We are challengers that can either be determined students or defiant critics. Being in charge is important to us, yet we care little about what others think as long as we get the job done. We have a great deal of foresight and examine every avenue to find the best solution. We prefer to work alone. Our greatest fear is rejection, but we thrive when it comes to motivating others. Our positive sense of humor helps us negotiate conflicts. Though we can be inattentive to details and poor listeners, we can be great peacemakers and effective teammates when we control our feelings and minimize our urge to entertain and be the center of attention. We value lots of human touch and connection.

We are persuaders who are outgoing and energetic. We enjoy large groups and use our power of influence to attain respect and convince people to follow our lead. Sometimes we can be viewed as fidgety and nervous, but it comes from our need to be a part of challenges that have variety, freedom, and mobility. We could benefit from learning to look before we leap and spending more time being studious and still. We make inspiring leaders and know how to get results from and through people.

John the Baptist (Luke 3), Peter (Matthew 16 and 26, Acts 3), Rebekah (Genesis 24)

We are influential counselors who love people, and it's no surprise that people love us. We live to please and serve, and tend to be good listeners. Looking good and encouraging others is important to us, as is following through and being obedient. We often lack in the area of organization and can be more concerned with the people involved than we are with the task at hand. However, we can be center stage or behind the scenes with equal effectiveness, and we shine when it comes to influencing and helping others.

Barnabas (Acts 4, 9, 11-15), Elisha (1 Kings 19, 2 Kings 2-3), Nicodemus (John 3, 7, 19)

- We are inspiring yet cautious assessors who are excellent communicators through the combination of concerned awareness and appreciation of people. We excel in determining ways to improve production. We tend to be impatient and critical, and can also be overly persuasive and too consumed by the desire to win. We like to work inside the box, and we could benefit from trying new things and caring less about what others think. This personality type often possesses a gift for teaching; we are generally dependable when it comes to paying attention to details and getting the job done.

 Miriam (Exodus 15-21), Ezra (Ezra 7-8), Shunammite Woman (2 Kings 4:8-37)
- We are steady and more reserved. We do not like change, and thrive in secure, non-threatening environments. We are often friendly and understanding as well as good listeners and loyal workers who are happy doing the same job consistently. With an incredible ability to forgive, reliable and dependable "S"s tend to make the best friends. Our greatest fear, however, is loss of security, and our possible weaknesses naturally include not only resistance to change, but also difficulty adjusting to it. We can also be too sensitive to criticism and unable to establish priorities. In order to avoid being taken advantage of, we need to be stronger and learn how to say "no." We also like to avoid the limelight, but when given an opportunity to genuinely help others, we will gladly rise to the occasion. We feel most valued when we have truly helped someone.

S/D We are quiet leaders who can be counted on to get the job done. We perform better in small groups and do not enjoy speaking in front of crowds. Though we can be soft- and hard-hearted at the same time, we enjoy close relationships with people, being careful not to dominate them. Challenges motivate us, especially ones that allow them to take a systematic approach. We tend to be determined, persevering through time and struggles. We benefit from encouragement and positive relationships.

Martha (Luke 10:38-42), Job (Job 1:5, James 5:11)

We are inspirational counselors who exhibit warmth and sensitivity. Tolerant and forgiving, we have many friends because they accept and represent others well. Our social nature and desire to be likable and flexible makes us inclined to be overly tolerant and non-confrontational. We will benefit from being more task-oriented and paying more attention to detail. Kind and considerate, we include others and inspire people to follow us. Words of affirmation go a long way with us, and with the right motivation, we can be excellent team players.

Mary Magdalene (Luke 7:36-47), Barnabas (Acts 4, 9, 11-15), Elisha (1 Kings 19, 2 Kings 2-13)

S/C We are diplomatic and steady, as well as detail-oriented. Stable and contemplative, we like to weigh the evidence and discover the facts to come to a logical conclusion. More deliberate, we prefer to take our time, especially when the decision involves others. Possible weaknesses include being highly sensitive and unable to handle criticism, and we also need to be aware of the way we treat others. Operating best in precise and cause-worthy projects, we can be a peacemaker; this makes us a loyal team member and friend.

Moses (Exodus 3, 4, 20, 32), John (John 19:26-27), Eliezer (Genesis 24)

We are compliant and analytical. Careful and logical lines of thinking drive us forward, and accuracy is a top priority. We hold high standards and value systematic approaches to problem solving. Though we thrive when given opportunities to find solutions, we tend to ignore the feelings of others and can often be critical and downright crabby. Verbalizing feelings is difficult for us, but when we are not bogged down in details and have clear-cut boundaries, we can be big assets to the team by providing calculated "reality checks." Our biggest fear is criticism, and our need for perfection is often a weakness, as is our tendency to give in when in the midst of an argument. However, we are thorough in all activities and can bring a conscientious, even-tempered element to the team that will provide solid grounding. We value being correct.

Though we work well with people, we are sometimes too sensitive to what others think about us and our work. We could benefit from being more assertive and self-motivated. Often excellent judges of character, we easily trust those who meet our standards. We are moved by genuine and enthusiastic approval as well as concise and logical explanations.

- C/S We are systematic and stable. We tend to do one thing at a time and do it right. Reserved and cautious, we would rather work behind the scenes to stay on track; however, we seldom take risks or try new things and naturally dislike sudden changes in our environments. Precisionists to the letter, we painstakingly require accuracy and fear criticism, which we equate to failure. Diligent workers, our motivation comes from serving others.

Esther (Esther 4), Zechariah (Luke 1), Joseph (Matthew 1:1-23)

We are cautious and determined designers who are consistently taskoriented and very aware of problems. Sometimes viewed as
insensitive, we do care about individual people but have a difficult
time showing it. We often feel we are the only ones who can do the
job the way it needs to be done, but because of our administrative
skills, we are able to bring plans for change and improvements to
fruition. We have a tendency to be serious and could benefit from
being more optimistic and enthusiastic. Despite our natural drive to
achieve, we should concentrate on developing healthy relationships
and simply loving people.

Bezalel (Exodus 35:30-36, 8, 37:1-9), Jochebed (Exodus 1:22-2:4), Jethro (Exodus 2,18)

"S" personalities are steady, stable, analytical, introverted, and people-oriented. As you embrace these strengths, also make sure to:

- Take initiative.
- Practice flexibility.
- Approach confrontation constructively.
- Be direct in your interactions when necessary.
- Realize change can be healthy, and be willing to adapt.
- Consider the overall goals of your family or group, not just specific processes or procedures.

"C" personalities are compliant, competent, task-oriented, goal-oriented, and introverted. As you embrace these strengths, also make sure to:

- Be decisive when necessary.
- Cultivate personal relationships.
- Be open to others' ideas and methods.
- Balance your focus between facts and people.
- Focus on doing the right things, not just doing things right.
- Help others accomplish their goals.

USING YOUR SPIRITUAL GIFTS

Congratulations on discovering your spiritual gifts! God uniquely created you and gave you these gifts for a reason. Now that you've identified how He has gifted you, your next step is to learn how you can use those gifts for the purpose He has for you.

On the following pages, you can learn about your spiritual gifts and find out more about the areas available to serve at Life Changers in which you can best use your gifts.

A. Administration

The gift of administration is the divine strength or ability to organize multiple tasks and groups of people to accomplish these tasks.

Luke 14:28-30; Acts 6:1-7; 1 Corinthians 12:28

(Experience, Host, Next Steps, Production, Store)

B. Apostleship

The gift of apostleship is the divine strength or ability to pioneer new churches and ministries through planting, overseeing, and training.

Acts 15:22-35; 1 Corinthians 12:28; 2 Corinthians 12:12; Galatians 2:7-10; Ephesians 4:11-14 (Life Group Leader, Next Steps, Life Changers Kids, Pastoral Care)

C. Craftsmanship

The gift of craftsmanship is the divine strength or ability to plan, build and work with your hands in construction environments to accomplish multiple ministry applications.

Exodus 30:22, 31:3-11; 2 Chronicles 34:9-13; Acts 18:2-3

(Café, Creative, Production)

D. Discernment

The gift of discernment is the divine strength or ability to spiritually identify falsehood and to distinguish between right and wrong motives and situations.

Matthew 16:21-23: Acts 5:1-11. 16:16-18: 1 Corinthians 12:10: 1 John 4:1-6

(Host, Exceptional Kids, Experience, Life Changers Kids, Life Group Leader)

E. Evangelism

The gift of evangelism is the divine strength or ability to help non-Christians take the necessary steps to becoming Christ followers.

Acts 8:5-6, 8:26-40, 14:21, 21:8; Ephesians 4:11-14

(Life Changers Kids, Life Group Leader, Pastoral Care)

F. Exhortation

The gift of exhortation is the divine strength or ability to encourage others through the written or spoken word and Biblical truth.

Acts 14:22; Romans 12:8; 1 Timothy 4:13; Hebrews 10:24-25

(Exceptional Kids, Host, Life Changers Kids, Life Group Leader, Next Steps, Pastoral Care, Spanish Translation)

G. Faith

The gift of faith is the divine strength or ability to believe in God for unseen supernatural results in every arena of life.

Acts 11:22-24; Romans 4:18-21; 1 Corinthians 12:9; Hebrews 11 (All Teams)

H. Giving

The gift of giving is the divine strength or ability to produce wealth and to give by tithes and offerings for the purpose of advancing the Kingdom of God on earth.

Mark 12:41-44; Romans 12:8; 2 Corinthians 8:1-7, 9:2-7 (All Teams)

I. Healing

The gift of healing is the divine strength or ability to act as an intermediary in faith, prayer, and by the laying-on of hands for the healing of physical and mental illnesses.

Acts 3:1-10, 9:32-35, 28:7-10; 1 Corinthians 12:9, 28 (First Responder, Pastoral Care)

J. Helps

The gift of helps is the divine strength or ability to work in a supportive role for the accomplishment of tasks in Christian ministry.

Mark 15:40-41: Acts 9:36: Romans 16:1-2: 1 Corinthians 12:28

(Experience, First Responder, Food Pantry, Host, Next Steps, Production, Spanish Translation, Store)

K. Hospitality

The gift of hospitality is the divine strength or ability to create warm, welcoming environments for others in places such as your home, office, or church.

Acts 16:14-15; Romans 12:13, 16:23; Hebrews 13:1-2; 1 Peter 4:9
(Café, Exceptional Kids, Food Pantry, Host, Hospitality, Life Changers Kids, Life Group Leader, Next Steps)

L. Intercession

The gift of intercession is the divine strength or ability to stand in the gap in prayer for someone, something, or someplace believing for profound results.

Hebrews 7:25; Colossians 1:9-12, 4:12-13; James 5:14-16

(Life Group Leader, Pastoral Care)

M. Knowledge

The gift of knowledge is the divine strength or ability to understand and to bring clarity to situations and circumstances often accompanied by a word from God.

Acts 5:1-11; 1 Corinthians 12:8; Colossians 2:2-3

(First Responder, Host, Life Group Leader, Pastoral Care, Spanish Translation)

N. Leadership

The gift of leadership is the divine strength or ability to influence people at their level while directing and focusing them on the big picture, vision, or idea.

Romans 12:8; 1 Timothy 3:1-13, 5:17; Hebrews 13:17 (All Teams)

O. Mercv

The gift of mercy is the divine strength or ability to feel empathy and to care for those who are hurting in any way.

Matthew 9:35-36; Mark 9:41; Romans 12:8; 1 Thessalonians 5:14

(Exceptional Kids, First Responder, Hospitality, Life Changers Kids, Life Group Leader, Pastoral Care)

P. Miracles

The gift of miracles is the divine strength or ability to alter the natural outcomes of life in a supernatural way through prayer, faith, and divine direction.

Acts 9:36-42, 19:11-12, 20:7-12; Romans 15:18-19; 1 Corinthians 12:10, 28 (First Responders, Pastoral Care)

Q. Missionary

The missionary gift is the divine strength or ability to reach others outside of your culture and nationality, while in most cases living in that culture or nation.

Acts 8:4, 13:2-3, 22:21; Romans 10:15

(Life Group Leader, Pastoral Care, Spanish Translation, Social Media)

R. Music/Worship

The gift of music/worship is the divine strength or ability to sing, dance, or play an instrument primarily for the purpose of helping others worship God.

Deuteronomy 31:22; 1 Samuel 16:16; 1 Chronicles 16:41-42; 2 Chronicles 5:12-13, 34:12; Psalm 150

(Life Changers Kids, Life Changers Worship, Production)

S. Pastor/Shepherd

The gift of pastor/shepherd is the divine strength or ability to care for the personal needs of others by nurturing and mending life issues.

John 10:1-18; Ephesians 4:11-14; 1 Timothy 3:1-7; 1 Peter 5:1-3

(Host, Life Changers Kids, Life Group Leader, Next Steps, Pastoral Care)

T. Prophecy

The gift of prophecy is the divine strength or ability to boldly speak and bring clarity to scriptural and doctrinal truth, in some cases foretelling God's plan.

BELIEFS

The Inspired Word: The Holy Bible

The Holy Bible, and only the Bible, is the authoritative Word of God. It alone is the final authority in determining all doctrinal truths. It is inspired, infallible, and inerrant. We live by faith in the complete integrity of God's Word.

Trinity

There is one God, eternally existent in three persons: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. These three are coequal and co-eternal.

1 John 5:7-8; Genesis 1:26; Matthew 3:16-17; 28:19; Luke 1:35; Isaiah 9:6; Hebrews 3:7-11

Jesus Christ

Jesus Christ is God the Son, the second person of the Trinity. On earth, Jesus was 100% God and 100% man. He is the only man ever to have lived a sinless life. He was born of a virgin, performed miracles, died on the cross for mankind, and thus became sin for us through the shedding of His blood, that we might become the righteousness of God, and saved by His grace. He rose from the dead on the third day according to the Scriptures, ascended to the right hand of the Father, and will return again in power and glory.

Satan

We believe that Satan was originally created a perfect being, as Lucifer. He rebelled against God. As a result he became depraved, the devil and adversary of God and His people, the leader of a host of angels who fell with him. Satan has been judged and defeated at the cross and awaits his ultimate doom at the conclusion of the Millennial Reign which takes place after the Second Coming of Jesus Christ.

The Fall of Man

Man was created good and upright; for God said, "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness!" However, man submitted to the lie of the serpent (Satan) and chose to disobey God, thereby incurring not only physical death but also spiritual death, which is separation from God. Love of God

God's love is the motivation for everything He does. He loved us while we were sinners. His love is unearned and undeserved. He loves us because He is love. And He so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. 1 John 4:8; Romans 5:8; John 3:16

Virgin Birth

Jesus Christ was conceived by God the Father, through the Holy Spirit (the third person of the Trinity) in the virgin Mary's womb; therefore, He is the Son of God.

Redemption

Man was created good and upright, but by voluntary transgression he fell; his only hope of redemption is in Jesus Christ, the Son of God. Not only are we redeemed from sin, through the blood of Jesus, but we are also redeemed from the curse of the Law and all its effects.

Born-Again

Jesus said, "Unless a man is born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God." Being born again simply means being re-created by God as a new creation. This happens the moment a person receives Jesus Christ as their Savior.

Salvation. Grace Saves us!

We are saved by grace through faith in Jesus Christ: His death, burial, and resurrection. Salvation is a gift from God, not a result of our good works or of any human efforts.

Repentance

Repentance is our response or reflex to the gospel and the goodness of God. It means to change your thinking, which changes your direction. God gives us the gift of repentance empowering us to turn from wrong thinking and wrong believing; and turn to Him in faith; leading us to a life of Spirit-inspired obedience.

Sanctification—Spirit, Soul & Body

Sanctification is the ongoing process of yielding to God's Word and His Spirit in order to complete the development of Christ's character in us. It is through the present ministry of the Holy Spirit and the Word of God that the Christian is enabled to live a Godly life.

Jesus' Blood

The Blood that Jesus Christ shed on the Cross of Calvary was sinless and is 100% sufficient to cleanse mankind of all sin. Jesus allowed Himself to be punished for both our sinfulness and our sins, enabling all those who believe to be free from the penalty of sin, which is death. His blood brings us into an unbreakable covenant with God.

Jesus Christ Indwells All Believers

When anyone receives Jesus Christ into their lives, they become a child of God and the Holy Spirit dwells within them. They put their trust in what Jesus accomplished for them when He died, was buried, and rose again from the dead. They are empowered to yield to the Holy Spirit's leadership and direction for their lives.

John 1:12; John 14:17, 23; Romans 8:11; Revelation 3:20; 2 Corinthians 3:18

Baptism in the Holy Spirit

All believers are entitled to, should ask for and expect "the promise of the Father" (Acts 1:5-8). The baptism in the Holy Spirit gives empowerment to preach the gospel boldly; and the physical sign of speaking with other tongues. (Acts 2:4; 10:46; 19:6). In every case when someone was baptized in the Holy Spirit, they also spoke in tongues—a heavenly language given for personal prayer and prophetic encouragement. This was the normal experience of all in the early Christian church. God will not force it upon you. He is a Gentleman.

The purpose:

- (1) Enables believers to evangelize in the power of the Spirit with accompanying supernatural signs

 Mark 16:15-20: Acts 4:29-31: Hebrews 2:3-4
- (2) Adds a necessary dimension to worshipful relationship with God 1 Corinthians 2:10-16; 12; 13; and 14
- (3) Enables believers to walk in the full expression of gifts and ministries as in New Testament times for the edifying of the body of Christ Galatians 5:22-26; 1 Corinthians 12:28; 14:12; Ephesians 4:11-12; Colossians 1:29

Also, with the baptism in the Holy Spirit comes such experiences as an overflowing fullness of the Spirit (John 7:37-39; Acts 4:8), a deepened reverence for God (Acts 2:42-43), and a more active love for Christ, for His Word, and for the lost (Mark 16:20).

The Gifts of the Holy Spirit

With the Holy Spirit also comes the power for life and service, access to the gifts and their uses in the work of the ministry (Luke 24:49; Acts 1:4; I Corinthians 12:1-31). The Holy Spirit gives a variety of spiritual gifts to build and edify the church and confirm the power of the Gospel. The gifts may occur in various combinations. All believers are instructed to earnestly desire the manifestation of the gifts in their lives. These gifts are always available and always operate in harmony with the Scriptures. They should never be used in a way that is contrary to biblical patterns.

The Church and Its Mission

A. The Church is the Body of Christ, where God lives inside of each one of us as members of His Body. Every person who is born of the Spirit is an integral part of the Church as a member of the body of believers. God places every believer in a church family, just as each of us is born into a specific family. We should gather together regularly to grow, be equipped, and serve God's people.

B. Since God's purpose concerning man is to seek and to save that which is lost, to be worshiped by man, and to build a body of believers in the image of His Son, the priority reason-for-being a part of Life Changers church family is:

- To be an agency of God for evangelizing the world Acts 1:8; Matthew 28:19-20; Mark 16:15-16
- To be a corporate body in which people can worship God 1 Corinthians 12:13
- 3. To build a body of believers being conformed to the image of His Son Ephesians 4:11-16; 1 Corinthians 12:28; 14:12
- 4. To develop servant leaders who walk in their God-given purpose in the church family and as ambassadors to this world

The Ministry

A divinely called and scripturally ordained ministry has been provided by our Lord for the threefold purpose of leading the Church in:

- Evangelization of the world Mark 16:15-2
- 2. Worship of God
 John 4:23-24
- 3. Building a body of saints being perfected in the image of His Son Ephesians 4:11-16

Sacraments

The Lord's Supper: A celebration of communion in the presence of God when the elements of bread and wine/grape juice (the Body and Blood of the Lord Jesus Christ) are taken in sharing the divine nature of our Lord Jesus Christ (II Peter 1:4); a remembrance of His suffering and death (I Corinthians 11:26); an activating of His blessing and power. (Mark 5:28); and a declaration of His second coming (I Corinthians 11:26) "until He comes!"

Water Baptism: Following faith in the Lord Jesus Christ, the new convert is instructed by the Word of God to be baptized in water in the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit (also referred to as the name of the Lord Jesus Christ).

Marriage: We believe marriage is defined in the Bible as a covenant, a sacred bond between one man and one woman, instituted by and publicly entered into before God.

Child Dedication: Since water baptism is an outward expression of an inward work of grace, we do not practice infant baptism. However, we do encourage presenting our children to the Lord in child dedication and blessing until they are old enough to make their own choice and decision. Luke 2:27; Mark 10:13-16

Healing of the Sick

Healing of the sick is illustrated in the life and ministry of Jesus and included in the commission of Jesus to His disciples. It is given as a sign, which is to follow believers. It is also a part of Jesus' work on the cross and one of the gifts of the Spirit.

Psalm 103:2-3; Isaiah 53:5; Matthew 8:16-17; Mark 16:17-18; Acts 8:6-7; James 5:14-16; 1 Corinthians 12:9, 28; Romans 11:29

God's Will for Provision

It is the Father's will for believers to become whole: spirit, soul & body. Because of the fall of Adam & Eve, sickness and the curse entered into the world. Christ redeemed us from sin and the curse, so that the blessing and benefits of God's will could go into effect in our lives. Though we have all experienced the effects of sin and the curse, all believers should seek the full benefits of Christ's provision in order to glorify what Jesus did on the cross, and better serve others.

Hell

After living one life on earth, those who rejected Jesus' sacrifice on the cross, will be judged and sent to Hell where they will be eternally tormented with the Devil and the Fallen Angels. It is not God who SENDS people to Hell. It is His will that none perish but all come to repentance. But when a person rejects the only sacrifice that can deliver them from sin, it is their sin that actually SENDS them to Hell. God is a God of compassion and love. He has provided salvation, but its up to people to receive it. That's why its so important that we spread the gospel to the world, one life at a time.

The Blessed Hope

The resurrection of those who have fallen asleep in Christ and their translation together with those who are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord is the imminent and blessed hope of the church (I Thessalonians 4:16-17; Romans 8:23; Titus 2:13; I Corinthians 15:51-52). Both the saved and the lost will be resurrected; those that are saved to the resurrection of life and those that are lost to the resurrection of eternal damnation.

The Millennial Reign of Christ

The Word of God promises the catching away of the believers, followed by the great tribulation, and then the return of our Lord with His saints and holy angels in power and great glory to reign on earth a thousand years. This millennial reign will bring the salvation of national Israel (Ezekiel 37:21-22; Zephaniah 3:19-20; Romans 11:26-27) and the establishment of universal peace (Isaiah 11:6-9; Psalms 72:3-8; Micah 4:3-4).

Second Coming

Jesus Christ will physically and visibly return to earth for the second time to establish His Kingdom. This will occur at a date undisclosed by the Scriptures.

The New Heaven and the New Earth

Race

God created all men equal in value and imputed upon them dignity and the Imago Dei (Image of God). Attempts to identify, treat, or view certain people or groups as lesser members of the body of Christ or of humankind are an affront to our Creator. Racism in all its forms is wrong, for it grounds the identity and security of human life in self, rather than God, in creature rather than the Creator, apart from whom a human being has no identity or value. Paul said, in Christ, we judge no man after the flesh any longer (2 Corinthians 5:16). We believe prejudice is a demonic attempt to reverse creation, and devalue what God has valued. Secondly, racism is an attempt to reverse the redemptive act of Jesus. In Christ, God became a Man and so identified Himself fully with every member of the humanity in whatever nation or culture they may be found. Through His grace, Jesus Christ has removed all barriers that stand between human beings, giving reconciliation through His cross.

Tithing was the first act of financial stewardship modeled by Abraham—in his relationship with the high priest, Melchizedek (a type and shadow of Christ). Abraham was the first to receive the gospel (in advance, Galatians 3:8). And we are called to follow the steps of faith that he took—Romans 4:12. The vision of the New Testament Church, its varied ministries, purposes and mission are fulfilled through the tithes and offerings of the believers.
